CS6-1 War Room Tactics

When fraud surfaces events can unfold quite rapidly, requiring those responsible for the organization's response to land on their feet running. Decisions made can affect such critical business issues as shareholder value, employee moral and the prospects for recovery of losses. A host of other legal, political and emotionally charged issues will need to be dealt with while under pressure.
